

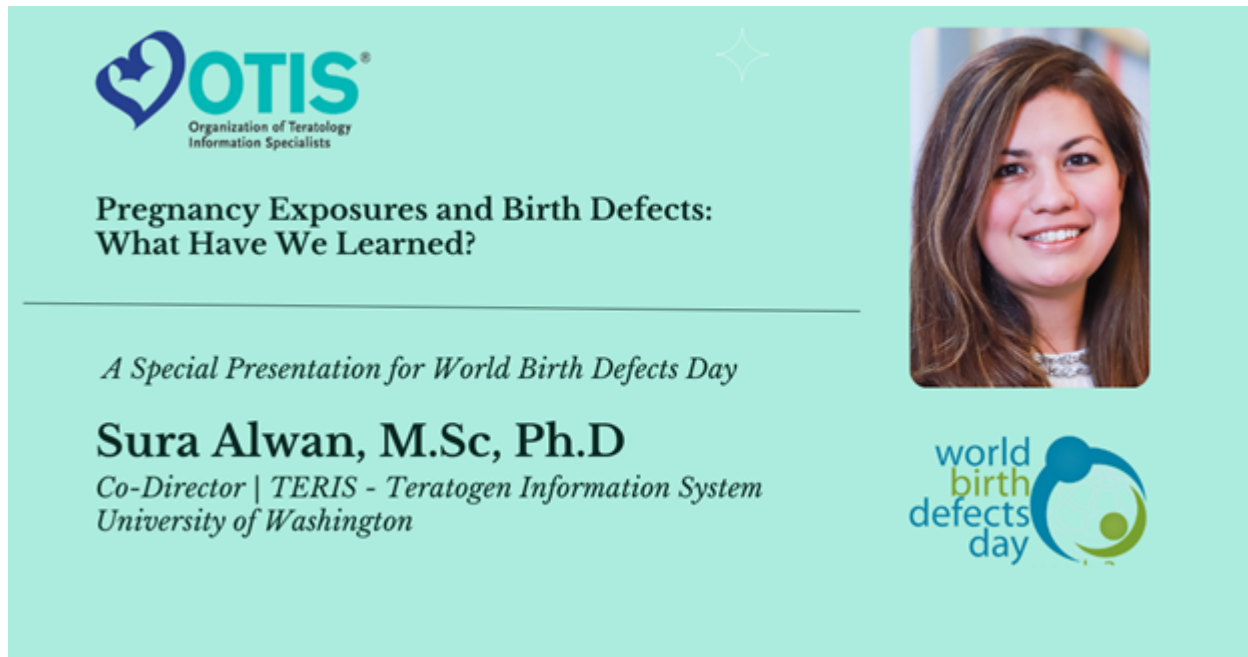
Pregnancy Exposures and Birth Defects: What Have We Learned?

Each year, about 1 in 33 babies in the United States is born with a structural birth defect. In recognition of World Birth Defects Day, this special webinar explores key discoveries and ongoing challenges in understanding birth defects.
